The power of our work together is undeniable. Over and over we hear from our participants a sense of

gratitude not only for those who have worked with them directly, but recognition of the many who have made the work possible through their financial support and in-kind donations. That you have come together with us to help make life better for a stranger is deeply moving and a source of hope for all. It reveals the reality of our deep connections to each other, seen and unseen.

BRING 'EM HOME....

A radical re-structuring of the shelter system in Massachusetts has been proposed. The core of the proposal shifts resources to helping families stay in or find housing in their communities, and away from emergency shelter. Wellspring supports this Housing First approach and also advocates for changes in the proposal which would protect families dealing with disabilities and ill-

Wellspring also strongly supports changes in public policies that would help families to move off assistance and

increase their ability to work. A slight increase in a family's income can result in being penalized with the severe and immediate loss of critical benefits like healthcare, food, and daycare. Known as the "cliff effect" our current public policies act as a disincentive for families to increase their incomes as they often cannot bridge the income gap fast enough to offset the

loss in benefits. Without changes in the public policies, the Housing First initiative will not be successful in the long term. Please talk to your state and federal representatives about the need for comprehensive public policies that will help families to Bridge the Gap.

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WELLSPRING WELCOMES FAMILY STABILIZATION CASE MANAGER

This past September, Rachel Loose joined Wellspring's staff as our full-time housing stabilization case manager. In this capacity, Rachel works closely with the families who have come through our shelter and are transitioning from homelessness to situations of permanent housing. Most of these families receive some form of eviction prevention assistance, like flex funds, which make it possible for them to afford their current apartments. Because such support is not a permanent solution families must learn how they will cope when their mandated period of assistance comes to an end. Rachel's primary focus in working with families is teaching them how to set and achieve realistic goals that will ultimately result in creating stability in terms of their housing, employment and general well-bring.

Families in the tenuous state between homelessness and sustainable housing often find themselves grappling with how best to manage the status of their income, their health and the health of their children. Families face obstacles like unemployment,

mental health issues, gaps in education and gaining access to marketable job skills. In these instances, Rachel provides guidance and offers concrete recommendations to help families address all that comes along with having a low income including getting children into daycare, transportation needs and communication access for non-english speakers. In addition, Rachel identifies where families can find healthy social support systems and other local resources. On a regular basis, Rachel checks in to asses where they stand with their responsibilities and the goals they've set for themselves.

Successfully fulfilling the goals set before them, like setting up meetings with career centers to explore employment possibilities, allows parents to feel ownership and a sense of responsibility in the progression from helplessness to empowerment. Rachel's focus on equipping families with this skill-set

does a great deal to increases the potential for an individual to move beyond the cycle of poverty. This is guintessentially what Wellspring aims to achieve in all its work.
