New Education Programs Fill in Gaps

ALMOST EVERYONE WHO WALKS THROUGH OUR DOORS NEEDS HELP figuring out how to get closer to a living wage job. It's projected that two thirds of the jobs of the future will require some type of post-secondary education or training: 2 or 4 year degrees, certificates, specialized job training. Today going to college or a job training program requires a sophisticated thought process and lots of information.

As we have followed people graduating from our education programs and pursuing their next steps it became clear that the sophisticated kind of counseling that people need was not readily accessible. It is especially important for low-income families to make smart choices and use their financial aid wisely.

To meet this need Wellspring is launching the **Wellspring Education Resource Center** (WERC). Adult learners can get help recognizing their strengths and passions and matching them to a potential living wage job that will utilize their talents. Each learner will get help creating a Personal Pathway to Success — a plan which will identify the right school or training program, the right degree or certificate, how it will be financed and a semester by semester plan for coursework and timeline for completion. There will also be a mentoring component. A team of volunteer mentors will be available to students to help them navigate through any obstacles they

encounter as they enter into the new, often daunting, college systems.

We are currently beta testing the process and tools with 15 adult learners and will formally launch WERC in July.

In May we are piloting the **Adult Learning Initiative 2** (ALI 2) program. This is a follow-up program to our existing ALI 1 adult education class. Although people are passing their high school equivalency exams they are receiving conditional acceptances from colleges. These students are not yet working at a college level in math and English and they are enrolled in intermediate courses at the colleges. These courses

are not credit bearing and are paid for with a student's financial aid. The failure and dropout rates are high. Wellspring has designed an ALI 2 math and English curriculum that will help students acquire the skills and competencies needed to demonstrate college level achievement. This will help students avoid the remedial courses and preserve their financial aid so it can be directed towards a degree or certificate. The courses will be offered in the evening. 


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
