This program is designed to help students advance in their careers and education by providing mentorship and resources for college, occupational education or placement in a new job.

Last year, WERC helped 179 find their pathways to higher education, job prospects, and living wage work through mentorship and guidance. Now, thanks to Institution for Savings, this work can continue into 2019.

Endless Possibilities. Over the past year Wellspring has taken time to speak with members of our community — program participants, staff, volunteers, and donors — to find out what Wellspring means to them.

In the words of one MediClerk Training Program student:

"Most people go to Wellspring looking to see if there is more f or them 'out there'. Wellspring gives hope that you are not stuck where you are forever. The word 'possibilities' actually defines Wellspring. There are possibilities everywhere, whether it is shelter, job training, getting a GED or being a mentor. There are endless possibilities."

In today's economy, it is more important than ever for parents to be able to earn a living wage, one that covers a true cost of living. Housing costs in Massachusetts are rising faster than any other state in the United States. Wellspring provides real opportunities for people to gain the training and education they need to move into new positions and raise up their earnings. We help families to address the root causes of housing crises and move forward. It takes time and trust.

The MediClerk student quoted above is in our current Fall 2018 class, training onsite at North Shore Medial Center full-time for 15 weeks. At the end of only one semester she will move immediately into a medical administrative position, increasing her entry level annual income by \$10,000 or more.

At Wellspring's foundation, our programs are built on supportive, authentic relationships. Whether parents and students come to Wellspring to take classes, work with a career advisor or a homelessness prevention case manager, they are offered a holistic range of opportunities. They are using education to improve their skills, their confidence and future job prospects.

But we can't do it without you! Together, we are making our community stronger.

Wellspring staff gave her the confidence and boost to further her education after her ALI graduation.

When computer teacher Jane Stevens came calling for help in volunteering in her computer class Sarah said "absolutely!" She knew how difficult it was for teachers to lead their students and tutor at the same time.

Passing on her knowledge to each group of students and seeing what they can accomplish is one of best part of volunteering for Sarah.

From Civil War to Prospective Paralegal

Sarah Archer maybe one of the most loved, appreciated and Kim came to our ALI Program in September 2017 from Liberia (West Africa). She had only been in the United States for a short time when she arrived at Wellspring. She grew up without opportunities and experienced eleven years of civil war, during which she was kidnapped and abused many times. She taught herself to read and write, and she learned to speak English by self-education and sheer determination.

On her first day of class at Wellspring House, Kim was very upset, terrified and unsure of what she was doing in this classroom with total strangers. We took it slow on Day 1 (Orientation) and offered her some snacks and tea during break time. She finished out her first day and returned the following morning for class. The transformation in her demeanor from one day to the next was remarkable. She was now smiling and ready to start learning math, writing and computers. She felt comfortable now. It was truly amazing.

Kim went on to complete this 8 week program and she also signed up for WERC (Wellspring Educational Resource Collaborative), Wellspring's mentoring and advising program.

In the spring of 2018, Kim joined 11 others to be part of the first group to graduate from Wellspring's Front Office Professional-Ability to Benefit Pilot Program. This program at North Shore Community College's Lynn Campus was



the first such program offered in Massachusetts allowing students without high school diplomas or GEDs to enroll in college level courses and degree programs. Kim is determined to keep moving forward until she reaches her educational and career goals. She wants to work towards an associates' degree in paralegal studies.

Kim gave a powerful and emotional speech at our June 2018 ALI End of Year Celebration. An excerpt from the end of her speech told the audience,

"Even sometimes as we procrastinate or we mess up over and over, even though in our journey we experience night and day, light and darkness, it does not matter. All that matters is that we keep going until we reach our destinations."

Believing that each life touches every other life, we work toward this vision of caring for the earth and her people by sharing our resources in a spirit of hospitality.

Our Mission

Wellspring House empowers individuals and families to live more secure lives through basic needs assistance, education and job training.

Education & Job Training

- 46% increase in participation over last year
- 179 people participated in the WERC Career Advising program
- 32 people participated in Wellspring's MediClerk job training program
- 10 students received education grant awards from the Robert Clarke Rogers Educational Opportunity Fund
- 69 students participated in our Adult Learning Initiative, with courses in computers, college readiness math and GED prep
- 99 students participated in English for Speakers of Other Languages (ESOL)

Basic Needs Work

- 20 homeless families were housed in Wellspring's Family Shelter
- 59 families (164 individuals) received support from Wellspring's Homelessness Prevention and Family Stabilization Program
- 405 callers to our Homeless
 Prevention Line received referrals
 and assistance
- 20 families received grants totaling \$18,000 from Small Can Be Big and Wellspring's Homelessness Prevention Fund to help avoid homelessness and stay in their homes
- 40 children received back to school backpacks and supplies
- 720 children from 291 families were served by our Holiday Store
- 11 low-income single adults lived in our single room occupancy residence their permanent home
